
# Roald Dahl's Matilal Homecoming Musical 2023

# Background:

- Originally a children's novel by Roald Dahl in 1988
- Adapted into a feature film in 1996
- Adapted into a musical in 2010
- Adapted into a movie musical in 2022



## Production History:

- In 2009, Royal Shakespeare Company announced their plan to stage an adaptation of *Matilda* with book by Dennis Kelly and music and lyrics by Tim Minchin.
- Matilda would play a 12-week run in Stratford-upon-Avon in 2010 to rave reviews
- Matilda would transfer to the West End in 2011 where it still plays to this day
- In 2013 Matilda would come to Broadway and play until 2017; won three Tonys






- Roald Dahl was born to Harald Dahl and Sofie Dahl on September 13, 1916, in Cardiff, Wales.
- Both of Dahl's parents were immigrants from Norway.
- Roald Dahl was the middle child of five children; they lived an upper-class life.
- Dahl's older sister and dad died when he was three.
- He would attend private schools until he was 18 then after graduating from Repton
   School join the Royal Air Force.
- Dahl served from 1939-1946. In that time he was a fighter pilot, an assistant air attaché, and supplied intelligence to the British Security Coordination.
- Dahl married Patricia Neal, an American actress, in 1953. They had five kids; they
  were together until 1983 when they divorced, and Dahl married his long time
  mistress, Felicity d'Abreu Crosland.
- Dahl died November 23, 1990, in Oxford, England. He was 74 years old.

Roald Dahl's Writing Career

- Dahl's first published work was an article published in The Saturday Evening Post and was about his time at war.
- Dahl's first children's book was *The Gremlins* published in 1943.
- Dahl would then go on to write such classics as James and the Giant Peach, Charlie and the Chocolate factory, Fantastic Mr. Fox, The BFG, The Witches, and Matilda.
- Dahl's children's books often featured kids put in oppressive situations by "evil" adults who are defeated through wits and often with help from a "good" adult.
- Dahl also wrote many short stories with sinister and dark themes; many were adapted for television in a series Dahl hosted.





# Book Writer: Dennis Kelly

- Born in 1970 in Barnet, UK
- Graduated from Goldsmiths College, University of London with a degree in Drama & Theatre Arts
- Drama Desk and Tony Award-winning writer
- In addition to Matilda's success, his plays have been staged by the National Theatre, including a stint at the Old Vic Theatre.



## Music and Lyrics: Tim Minchin

- Born on October 7, 1975, in Northampton, UK, but raised in Perth, AU
- Graduated from University of Western Australia and attended the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts
- Got his start in comedy writing and held a successful stand-up comedy career
- Matilda was the first musical he wrote.
- Winner of two Olivier Awards for *Groundhog Day* the musical and *Matilda*



# Story & Setting:

- Story centers around Matilda Wormwood a five-year-old girl genius who uses her telekinesis and wit to overcome her problems
- Takes place in Buckinghamshire, England
- Matilda has a timeless setting



# Buckinghamshire:

- Located in the South East England
- With a total population of 808,666
- The largest settlement in the county is Milton Keynes
- Milton Keynes' summers are an average temp of 66 F 73 F, and its winters stay between 43 F - 47 F.
- Buckinghamshire holds two of England's longest rivers: the River Thames and the River Great Ouse.

## Telekinesis

- Telekinesis is defined as the ability to move or deform inanimate objects (as by a spiritualistic medium) without contact or other physical means.
- It can also be a catchall term for a slew of special abilities that include biological healing and the transmutation of matter.
- One of the first examples of telekinesis in literature is in the "Mahabharata" which is a Sanskrit Epic from the third century.
- The term telekinesis did not show up until the late 19th century when Russian researcher Alexander N. Aksakov coined the term though he was mainly focused on communing with spirits.
- It wasn't until the 1930s when American parapsychologist J.B. Rhine began conducting experiments about psychokinesis (scientific name for telekinesis) with the results suggesting that psychokinesis was, indeed, possible.
- In the 1970s PEAR or Princeton Engineering Anomalies Research Lab was founded specifically for studying psychokinesis.

# Telekinesis cont.

- Robert G. Jahn set up a device that dropped 9,000 billiard balls into a series of 19 cartons. When no human being was present during the experiment, the balls consistently dropped in a cascading effect, with the center carton getting the most balls while the cartons to its left and right got progressively fewer. When a human participant was asked to try to psychically alter the machine, the bulk of the balls shifted right of center.
- Brian Josephson and co-author Fotini Pallikara-Viras tried to explain psychokinesis using quantum physics citing the old wives-tale that our minds are mostly underutilized wonder machines.

#### Telekinesis: Does the evidence hold up?

- No not really at all
- The first problem is the action of telekinesis or psychokinesis violates three fundamental laws of physics: the second law of thermodynamics, the conservation of momentum (motion never changes in objects that are isolated), and the inverse square law (<u>Inverse Square Law - Physics</u>)
- The evidence supporting psychokinesis does not stand up to scrutiny. All the studies, especially J.B. Rhine's study, are littered with confirmation bias, experimenter's bias, and cognitive bias.
- The saying that we only use 10% of our brains is not only misguided but woefully wrong.

### History of Trunchbull casting

- The casting of Miss Agatha Trunchbull has been a male in every major cast up to date for specifically the stage show.
- With a range of G4 A2 it puts it in a high baritone range.
- It is very hard to cheat height on stage like you can on film and making Trunchbull tower over the kids is an important factor to director Matthew Warchus.
- Bertie Carvel originated Trunchbull both on the West End and on Broadway receiving an Olivier award and a Tony Award nomination.
