Director's Note

I first read The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940 in 1995. And I laughed. A lot.

And I really wanted others to experience the same thing. So, after my high school graduation, I spent that summer of '96 getting some friends together and we put on a no-budget production at the Grace Museum. I asked an Abilene door company to donate French doors. And they did! They helped class up my cardboard walls. We used paint donated from a local paint supply store because no one wanted it. So, pink striped cardboard walls it was! The show turned more into a "Comedy of Errors" than a "Comedy of Murders," but we had a blast and seven of the ten cast members went on to get theatre degrees from ACU!


I took that endeavor on at the age of 18 because theatre and film are special art mediums to me. They can take people on an emotional journey from the safety of their chair. They are windows into another world that can give you a break from your circumstance and give you empathy for another's. You can weep on your couch without personally being a castaway on an island; you can join in the battle cry of "FREEDOM!" but not experience the personal sacrifice; or you can laugh so hard you forget about your own life-struggles for two hours. And hopefully you walk away with a new perspective and lifted spirit.

Different genres create different experiences. For me, there is something about a good laugh and fun mystery that warms my heart. In John Truby's book *The Anatomy of Genres*, he writes about the seeking and revealing of truth being a fundamental part of the mystery genre. As a Christian, this echoes deep in my heart. God has written upon our heart to know Truth and to seek out Truth. I think that is why the mystery or "riddle to be solved" draws people in. We were meant to seek and know the Truth. He has wired us for this journey... to seek and know Truth.

That being a bit of the background of my journey with this script, I wanted to direct *The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940* for you. To provide laughter, a break from the world and your personal struggles, and lead you to think about what it is to have Truth revealed to you wherever you are in life. I hope you enjoy the journey for Truth echoed in this play today, as it has for me since 1995.
